



#### Course Outline

**Course Description:** Course will be designed to educate new officials to the science of refereeing high school wrestling matches. Upon completion, new officials will have a working knowledge of the rules and be able to understand the intent, as well as the letter of the rules.

1. Student will recognize the importance of the officials' appearance, demeanor, and mechanics in controlling the match and the mat area. They will understand the objective of preventive officiating and the role pre-meet duties and officiating mechanics have in meeting that objective. They will be able to identify signals and recognize the proper positioning by an official various mat situations. They will be able to recognize various scoring maneuvers and the associated match points, corresponding to those maneuvers. The student will understand match scoring and team scoring in dual meet competition. They will be familiar with other terminology associated with conducting a match and be able to distinguish among associated terms i.e.(stalemate vs stalling, injury time vs recovery time vs blood time). Students will know the importance of recognizing dangerous situations and being in position to stop them. They will recognize all illegal and potentially dangerous situations. Students will understand the nature of technical violations and the importance of understanding the difference between these and illegal holds. They will understand the calls relative to the conduct of wrestlers, coaches and spectators.	Lecture, group discussion, overheads and video will be emphasized as well as on the mat work. # **Infractions**

  - xii) Front quarter nelson with chin
  - xiii) Double under hook, snap back from standing position
  - xiv) Any hold used for punishment

  - xvi)Over scissors with pressure
